








PHONICS

RESPECTING

PHASE I

- All about sounds, musical, environmental, voice and body
- Aural discrimination of sounds, including letter sounds
- Blending and segmenting orally



PHASE 2

- Learning specific letters and sounds
- Reading tricky words:
 - I go no to the
- Blending and segmenting vc and cvc words, and in captions and sentences



HOW DOES IT SOUND?

- No -uh unless it's 'u'!
- Think about your mouth





PHASE 3

- All other sounds are taught
- Alphabet names are important to describe the sounds made by more than one letter
- More tricky words for reading
- Writing I go no to the



TRICKY WORDS




TRICKY WORDS

Your child needs to learn to read these words by sight. Here are some ways you can support them with this at home:

- Play snap, pairs etc
- Word splat
- Build short sentences
- Recognise them in 'real' reading, e.g. can you spot 'the' on every page
- First learn to read them, then learn to write them and use in sentences.



BOOKS







THE BOOKS ARE RELATIVELY EASY TO READ

- They mimic natural patterned language.
- They contain repetitive phrases.
- They are full of picture clues.
- The words are fairly simple and easy to predict.
- The books contain a range of words both phonically decodable and tricky words.

MY CHILD IS LEARNING THE BOOK OFF BY HEART

- Well yes they are!
- This is one of the first stages of becoming a successful reader.
- They are learning that words contain meaning!
- In time children learn to read more words and use their knowledge of phonics to decode.



HOW TO READ WITH YOUR CHILD AT HOME



- Discuss the front cover-what could the story be about?
- Read the title together
- Look at the pictures-what can you see? Can you tell me what you think is going to happen?
- Ask your child to sound out the letters and blend the words together. At this
 stage they may be able to sound out the letters but you may need to model
 how to blend. Encourage them to point to each word.
- Recognising tricky words on the page
- Ask questions about the story



HOW CAN I HELP MY CHILD AT HOME?

- Listen to your child read
- De bug the book
- Support them decoding unfamiliar words
- Phonic games
- Tricky words
- Join the local library

READING

- The expectation in Reception is to read with your child at least 3 times a week

THE BENEFITS OF READING TO YOUR CHILD



Sets children up to achieve – The more you read to your child, the more knowledge they absorb, and knowledge is important in all aspects of life.

Develops language skills – Reading books ensures that your child is exposed to vocabulary on different topics.

Exercises your child's brain — Reading to young children affects their brain activity and can support and promote early reading skills.

Enhances concentration - Children learn to concentrate and sit still for longer periods of time, which can help when they go to school.

Encourages a thirst for knowledge — Leads to questions about the book and the information within.

Teaches about different topics – Gives a wide range of information for children to learn.

Develops imagination and creativity – Engagement with a book prompts children to imagine what the characters are doing; they imagine the setting as reality.

Helps to develop empathy – Children identify with characters and feel what they are feeling.

Books are a form of entertainment - Children will become more likely to choose a book to read for pleasure over another activity when they are bored.
