We promote these values through our own school values and curriculum.

UN CRC Article 2: The Convention applies to everyone whatever their race, religion, abilities, whatever they think or say and whatever type of family they come from.

UN CRC Article 30: Children have a right to learn and use the language and customs of their families, whether these are shared by the majority of people in the country or not.

We have high expectations about pupil conduct and this is reflected in our Behaviour Policy. Children are taught about the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child and learn to respect their rights and the rights of others. Through our school's values, PSHE and circle time children are taught to respect each other, to be cooperative and collaborative, be supportive and to look for similarities while being understanding of differences.

Mutual respect is also promoted through PSHE lessons and assemblies. Children are taught about the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child and learn to respect their rights and the rights of others.
