Please note the last day of term is 12th February. School will re-open for Key worker/vulnerable children on 22nd February.



A Message from The University of Bristol Research, CoMMinS project ie. Y2, Y5 and now Y6 children in school.

I wanted to update you on the status of

the CoMMinS study now that the vaccination programme is being rolled out in Bristol, as there may be some questions about how relevant the testing still is.

In short, it's still very much so.

While vaccination protects the majority of people from serious illness, it is not known to what degree it will influence transmission of Covid-19. This is a very important question that the CoMMinS study can help to answer if we keep collecting samples from vaccinated individuals. So we are continuing to run the saliva testing programme and encouraging staff and students to participate whether they have had a vaccination or not.

The team's first visit was on 3rd February. We are still looking for more volunteers to join the study in March so if your child is in Y2, Y5 or Y6 and they are in key worker/vulnerable pupil school please ask the office for the online consent details for the CoMMinS study.

It involves spitting into a tube once a month!

In the Finance and Staffing Committee Meeting, Governors monitored the budget and agreed the current Outturn which shows how the school is managing its finances. Like all schools, we have had to manage extra spending on PPE and other Covid-19 related matters. You may hear in the news that the government is funding this extra spending. So far we have been able to claim £10,000 out of the £60,000 extra we've spent on Covid-19 in the first 6 months. The remainder of the funds has had to come out of the school budget. Currently, we are still able to make ends meet. We are grateful for donations towards PPE and laptops that parents have generously made.

E-Safety Day 9th Feb: Keeping up to date with your children's use of technology can be a challenge, especially if you feel that your children may have better technical skills than you do. However, children still need support and guidance when it comes to managing their lives online and using the internet positively and safely. A simple and effective way to get involved with your children and their lives online is through discussion.

Conversation starter ideas:

Ask them about how they stay safe online. What tips do they have for you, and where did they learn them? What is OK and not OK to share?

- Ask them if they know where to go for help, where to find the safety advice, privacy settings and how to report or block on the services they use.
- Encourage them to help. Perhaps they can show you how to do something better online or they might have a friend who would benefit from their help and support.
- Think about how you use the internet as a family. What could you do to get more out of the internet together and further enjoy your lives online?

varying reasons, we would rather parents didn't send any treats for consumption in school. We have in the past allowed biscuits but with the increased risk of contamination from the virus, we feel the best solution is not to send any treats into school at all at present. Thank you.



Adverse Weather and possible School Closure. In exceptional circumstances e.g. heavy snow or failure of heating systems we may need to close the school. However, this is always the last resort so parent/ carers should

always assume we will be OPEN unless we tell you otherwise.

Ways we may be able to inform you of closure are through Parentmail, local radio, Bristol City Council website listing school closures, the school's own website (see address below). Any systems can be clogged up by a large amount of usage so please bear with us and remember we are trying to do our best. You can also try phoning the school if you are uncertain or coming from a long way away. In the event of partial closure, we allow 30 children to attend for every teacher present. Thank you.

The government requires schools to outline their remote learning offer to parents. Staff have been working very hard to provide remote learning to enable your child to continue to learn when they are out of school. Mr Jones and Mrs Head are in charge of Remote Learning and they have put together a Remote Learning offer which is on the school website under Key Information/policies. We realise that learning at home is different from learning in school and we have tried to provide materials and resources that enable parents to be able to juggle their work, home life and caring commitments. It is impossible to come up with a one size fits all solution. We understand that different families will need to approach learning in different ways and at different times. The times on our timetables are there as a guide and to help you see when teachers will be around to mark and give feedback or further instructions to aid understanding. This is part of their live interaction with pupils.

A few parents have asked why we are not streaming live lessons like some secondary schools. There are several reasons for this. One is that not all children and parents can be sat down at the same time due to work commitments and therefore having work which can be done at a time to suit them is better. Also, according to research by OFSTED, live streaming of lessons has not been found to been the most effective way to teach young children as children are not actively engaged for more than a few minutes at a time. They need a variety of activities and children actually need to DO things rather than just sit and listen to their teachers. Even in school we do not have teachers standing at the board for an hour during a lesson. Instead staff are making short video clips followed by time to do a task. This is working for most of our children and means you can access it when it suits you eg around working, going out to the supermarket, or for a daily walk.

If you need support with remote learning, please ask during phone calls and Zoom meetings or email the office and ask for it to be forwarded to the class teacher.

Please don't worry if your child doesn't have time to complete everything, prioritise the English and Maths and do some fun activities for balance.




