What is the Early Years Foundation Stage?

• The Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) is a statutory framework for the education of children from birth to the end of the Reception year.

• It is based on the recognition that children learn best through play and active learning.

4 Overarching Principles

- 1 Every child is unique
- 2 Children learn to be strong and independent through positive relationships
- 3 Children learn and develop well in enabling environments
- 4 Children develop and learn in different ways and at different rates

The unique child learns in different ways and at different rates through interactions in positive relationships and in enabling environments.





Characteristics of effective learning

- different ways in which children learn
- Playing and exploring investigate and experience things – 'having a go'
- Active learning concentrate and keep on trying if they encounter difficulties, and enjoy achievements
- Creative and thinking critically develop own ideas and develop strategies for doing this

Personal social and emotional development

The children will be learning to:

- Become self confident
- Take an interest in things
- Know what their own needs are
- Manage their feelings and behaviours



AISO

- Rights Respecting School
 - Jigsaw



- Encouraging your children to be more independent, e.g wash their hands, put on and fasten their coats, dressing and undressing, toileting independently.
- Play games which encourage sharing and turn taking to help your child build their social skills.
- Letting Children join in with every day activities, e.g. washing up cooking, shopping, in the garden.





Communication and Language

The children will be learning to:

- Talk confidently and clearly
- Understand different elements of language (understanding questions, prepositions and following instructions)
- Develop their spoken language
- Build listening and attention skills
- Develop confidence and skills in expressing self and to speak and listen in a range of situations
- Enjoy listening to stories, song and poems



- Reading books, magazines, comics, information books
- Encouraging your child to join in and talk about books
- Singing songs and nursery rhymes
- Taking time to listen to them talking about things they've done and answering their questions-encourage them to listen to you!





Physical development

The children will be learning to:

- move confidently
- control their body
- handle equipment safely
- hold a pencil correctly



AISO

• Leap into Life twice weekly either in the hall, outside or within class





- Give children time to run, jump, climb and play outdoors
- Encourage children in activities such as building, drawing, threading beads or filling and emptying containers in the water-all of which develop manipulative skills
- Play dough-children love it and it is great for strengthening muscles in their arms and hands



Literacy -reading and writing

The children will be learning to:

- hear and say sounds and link them to the letters of the alphabet
- understand rhyme an alliteration
- become interested in books and handle books correctly
- read and write familiar words
- write simple sentences
- learn to use a pencil effectively
- form their letters correctly

- Modelling letter formation and pencil grip
- Model writing in lower case
- Point to different words when you are out and about, e.g. road signs, shop names. Can they tell you the initial sound? Can they help you read it?
- Model sounding out simple words when you are writing. Encourage them to help you
- Practising tricky words





Mathematics



Numbers – counting, understanding and using numbers, calculating simple addition and subtraction problems

Shape, space and measure - describing shapes, spaces and measures

The children will be learning to:

- · count reliably
- develop an understanding of maths through stories, songs, games and imaginative play
- Become comfortable with numbers and with ideas such as 'heavier' or 'taller'
- Use everyday language related to money and time
- Understand concepts such as sharing, doubling and having
- Be aware of shapes and space



- Talk about the shapes you can see in you environment
- Comparing sizes and weights of items
- Point out numbers all around
- Singing counting songs
- Counting, adding and subtracting anything and everything-socks, cards, shopping, peas, grapes, fingers and toes!





Understanding the world

The children will be learning to:

- find out about the world around them, asking questions about it
- find differences and similarities
- know about everyday technology and learn what it is used for
- find out about past events in their lives and families lives
- find out about different cultures, beliefs and occupations

- Explore the natural environment
- Answering and asking questions- what if...?
 Why do you think...? How did you...?
- Taking about special times and events
- If possible let them have access to technology e.g. CD players, computers etc.



Expressive arts and design

The children will explore:

- Colours and textures
- Making and creating things using different media
- Imaginative play
- Making music, dancing and singing









- Talk with your child about their imaginative play and join in if possible!
- Encourage them to be creative in their thinking and use of materials
- Talk about the colour and texture of things
- Make up silly songs!



Your child's day...

- They could be inside or out
- Choosing activities independently or with friends
- Whole class carpet times
- Whole class lessons for physical development, phonics or music etc
- With an adult grouped by ability or interests
- Playtime and lunch time with FS children
- · Assembly with whole school

Learning diaries



- We continually observe, assess and record your children's achievements & progress on Ipads throughout year
- This year we are using a new system called Tapestry so please bear with us as we are learning how to use it!
- Each term there will be at least one observation in each area
 of learning for your child. Some weeks there will be an
 observation and some weeks there may not-it depends what
 your child is up to each day!
- You can log on to Tapestry with Via the website or on the app and look at your child's observations.
- You can write your own observations of your child to show us what they can do or like to do at home. There are some things that are easier to observe from home rather than at school, e.g. I can walk up the stairs carrying an object, I can get dressed by myself, I can share with my brother/sister, I can count to 10 etc.

LOST MINUTES = LOST LEARNING


